******While requirement may say "abstinence-based" or to "stress abstinence" as the standard, many CSE programs only mention abstinence in passing; they don't establish abstinence as the expected standard and fail to emphasize abstinence as the only sure way to protect against pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS.

II. ARKANSAS SEX EDUCATION FEDERAL FUNDING PROFILE

Federal Government Programs and Grants Awarded for Arkansas

WARNING: While grant requirements may state that curricula/programs are to be "evidence based" or "medically accurate" in order to receive funding, research shows that, often, funds go to curricula/programs that are ineffective (See SexEdReport.org). In addition, content analyses show that many programs (Link to harmful CSE elements chart) normalize teen sex, encourage sexual pleasure-seeking, condone early sexual debut and promote high-risk sexual behaviors. It is important to look at the actual content of every curricula rather than relying on labels assigned to them.

DASH—Division of Adolescent and School Health, a division of the Centers for Disease Prevention (CDC), works with community partners to provide training and resource development for so-called "HIV, STD, and pregnancy prevention" programs in school-based and community settings.

• Arkansas received DASH funds totaling \$415,000 in fiscal year 2016.

PREP—The **Personal Responsibility Education Programs,** under the Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB), provides grants for sex education programs that are sometimes called "abstinence plus" programs and that focus on "both abstinence and contraception."

• Arkansas received PREP funds totaling \$451,596 in fiscal year 2017.

SRAE—**Sexual Risk Avoidance Education** grants go to curricula/programs that emphasize risk avoidance and teach youth to voluntarily refrain from non-marital sexual activity and other risky behaviors. Note: See warning above.

• Arkansas received NO SRAE program funds in 2016.

Title V—The **TITLE V State Abstinence Education Grant Program** funds abstinence education and mentoring to promote abstinence. However, note that at least one Title V program promotes promiscuity as healthy and normal. As noted above, **it is important to look at the actual content of the curricula.**

• Arkansas received a Title V award totaling \$791,939 in fiscal year 2017.



TPP—The **Teen Pregnancy Prevention** program, through the Office of Adolescent Health (OAH), funds comprehensive sex education programs for children aged 10 to 19. Note: Research shows that most TPP programs are ineffective at reducing pregnancy rates and some even increase risk. (See <u>SexEdReport.org</u>)

Arkansas received NO TPP funding for years 2015-2019.ⁱ



III. FEDERALLY FUNDED SEX EDUCATION PROGRAMS IN ARKANSAS

Note: Programs in <u>red</u> text have been analyzed and found to contain harmful content for children. Programs not in red may or may not have harmful content.

IV. OVERVIEW OF ARKANSAS SEX EDUCATION LEGISLATION & GUIDELINES

The following laws and guidelines apply to sex education and how sex education is taught in Arkansas.

According to Arkansas Title 6 (updated 2018)

Sexual/Human Reproductive Education is not required but optional. Nevertheless, requirements to follow are mentioned below if schools choose to teach it.

6-18-703ⁱⁱ

- No school-based health clinic may be established in a public school until requested by resolution by the school district board of directors
- If a school-based clinic is established:
 - o no child shall receive school-based health clinic services without parental consent.
 - Parental consent to contraceptive services and condom distribution shall be specific, in writing, and maintained in the student's health records.
 - All school-based clinics shall maintain accurate records of the distributing and prescribing of contraceptives and condoms.
 - The number of pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases among students in the schools with school-based clinics shall be transmitted annually to the school district board of directors.
 - the board of directors shall retain absolute control over the operations and programs offered by the clinic.
 - Department of Health employee working in the clinic shall be subject to the supervision and control of the school district board of directors.
 - No state funds shall be used for the purchase or dispensing of contraceptives or abortifacients in public schools.
 - The school district board of directors of every school district that associates itself with distributing, recommending, or prescribing condoms or contraceptives shall adopt a resolution acknowledging that there are risks associated with teen sexual activities.
- Schools that offer sex education in school-based health clinics shall include:
 - o instruction in sexual abstinence, and no funds shall be utilized for abortion referral.
 - It is hereby recognized that sexual activity by students places our youths at increased risk of pregnancy and the contraction of acquired immune deficiency syndrome and other sexually transmitted diseases, and it is the policy of the State of Arkansas to discourage such sexual activity.
 - It is further required that every public school and public health department sex education and acquired immune deficiency syndrome prevention program shall emphasize premarital abstinence as the only sure means of avoiding pregnancy and the sexual contraction of acquired immune deficiency syndrome and other sexually transmitted diseases.



The Health Education Framework for Arkansas Department of Education 2011ⁱⁱⁱ includes:

- Describing methods for pregnancy prevention, including abstinence
- Comparing and contrasting abstinence to other forms of contraception to reduce the risks of unintended pregnancy
- Compare and contrast communicable and non-communicable diseases (e.g., STIs, HIV/AIDS, bacterial/viral infections, heredity, lifestyle, environment):
 - o Symptoms
 - o causes
 - risk factors
- Reviewing methods of HIV/STI transmission and contraction
- Analyze the importance of sexual abstinence and other forms of contraception in teen relationships
- Examine short-term and long-term responsibilities and consequences of sexual behaviors
- Identify physical, emotional, and legal consequences of abusive and risky situations (e.g., bullying, cyber-bullying, date rape, DUI, Internet dangers, sexual abuse)

Age of Majority =

Based on Arkansas law, anyone under the age of 18 is considered a minor, while those 18 years old and older are considered adults.^{iv}

Age of Consent =

In Arkansas, the age when children can legally consent or agree to sex is $16.^{v}$



V. PARENTAL RIGHTS AT RISK IN ARKANSAS

Warning! Most CSE programs put parental rights at risk by either encouraging or requiring that parents not be notified and/or by instructing children how to access such things as abortion, contraception and other so-called health services **without parental notification or consent**.

It is particularly dangerous to encourage students in this way, particularly considering the fact the laws often support what is being taught in CSE programs. For example:

Without notifying or receiving consent from their parents, minor children in Arkansas may consent to and receive:

- All contraceptive services
- All STI (sexually transmitted infection) services*
- All prenatal care services
- All adoption services
- All abortion services

*Health care practitioners MAY, but are not required to, inform parents when minors seek STI services.

VII. OPT-OUT FORM

By signing a parental non-consent form, also known as an opt-out form, parents can protect their children from being subjected to harmful CSE programs. Download and print the provided form and modify it as needed (see included instructions). Sign it and take it to your child's school, and ask that it be put on file as part of your child's permanent record and that all teachers and instructors be notified.
