**\*\***While requirement may say "abstinence-based" or to "stress abstinence" as the standard, many CSE programs only mention abstinence in passing; they don't establish abstinence as the expected standard and fail to emphasize abstinence as the only sure way to protect against pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases, including AIDS.

### **II. ALABAMA SEX EDUCATION FEDERAL FUNDING PROFILE**

Federal Government Programs and Grants Awarded for Alabama

**WARNING:** While grant requirements may state that curricula/programs are to be "evidence based" or "medically accurate" in order to receive funding, research shows that, often, funds go to curricula/programs that are ineffective (See SexEdReport.org). In addition, content analyses show that many programs (Link to harmful CSE elements chart) normalize teen sex, encourage sexual pleasure-seeking, condone early sexual debut and promote high-risk sexual behaviors. It is important to look at the actual content of every curricula rather than relying on labels assigned to them.

**DASH—Division of Adolescent and School Health**, a division of the Centers for Disease Prevention (CDC), works with community partners to provide training and resource development for so-called "HIV, STD, and pregnancy prevention" programs in school-based and community settings.

• Alabama received DASH funds totaling \$60,000 in fiscal year 2016.

**PREP**—The **Personal Responsibility Education Programs,** under the Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB), provides grants for sex education programs that are sometimes called "abstinence plus" programs and that focus on "both abstinence and contraception."

• Alabama received PREP funds totaling \$719,919 in fiscal year 2017.

**SRAE**—**Sexual Risk Avoidance Education** grants go to curricula/programs that emphasize risk avoidance and teach youth to voluntarily refrain from non-marital sexual activity and other risky behaviors. Note: See warning above.

• Alabama received NO SRAE program funds in 2016.

Title V—The TITLE V State Abstinence Education Grant Program funds abstinence education and mentoring to promote abstinence. However, note that at least one Title V program promotes promiscuity as healthy and normal. As noted above, it is important to look at the actual content of the curricula.

• Alabama received a Title V award totaling \$1,304,186 in fiscal year 2017.

**TPP**—The **Teen Pregnancy Prevention** program, through the Office of Adolescent Health (OAH), funds comprehensive sex education programs for children aged 10 to 19. Note: Research shows that most TPP programs are ineffective at reducing pregnancy rates and some even increase risk. (See <u>SexEdReport.org</u>)

Alabama received NO TPP funding for between year 2015-2019.<sup>i</sup>

Note: Alabama received \$867,552 in federal funds for abstinence-only-until-marriage programs in fiscal year 2010.





### III. FEDERALLY FUNDED SEX EDUCATION PROGRAMS IN ALABAMA

#### Note: Programs in <u>red</u> text have been analyzed and found to contain harmful content for children. Programs not in red may or may not have harmful content.

For example, the analysis of <u>Making a Difference</u>, shows CSE programs sexualize children and encourage promiscuity and risky sexual behavior, typically without providing medically accurate information about the long-term risks associated with early sexual debut and experimentation.

# IV. OVERVIEW OF ALABAMA SEX EDUCATION LEGISLATION & GUIDELINES

The following laws and guidelines apply to sex education and how sex education is taught in Alabama.

#### According to Alabama Title 16-40A-2, 16-1-16, 16-1-20.5, 16-1-28" (ACT 1992)

- No public funds or public facilities are to be used to promote lifestyle or activities prohibited by sodomy and sexual misconduct laws.
- Any program or curriculum in the public schools in Alabama that includes sex education or the human reproductive process shall, as a minimum, include and emphasize the following:
  - Abstinence from sexual intercourse is the only completely effective protection against unwanted pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) when transmitted sexually.
  - Abstinence from sexual intercourse outside of lawful marriage is the expected social standard for unmarried school-age persons.
- Course materials and instruction that relate to sexual education or sexually transmitted diseases should be age-appropriate.
- Course materials and instruction that relate to sexual education or sexually transmitted diseases should include all of the following elements:
  - An **emphasis on sexual abstinence** as the only completely reliable method of avoiding unwanted teenage pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases.
  - An **emphasis on the importance of self-control and ethical conduct** pertaining to sexual behavior.
  - Statistics based on the latest medical information that indicate the degree of reliability and unreliability of various forms of contraception, while also emphasizing the increase in protection against pregnancy and protection against sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV and AIDS infection, which is afforded by the use of various contraceptive measures.
  - Information concerning the laws relating to the financial responsibilities associated with pregnancy, childbirth, and child rearing.
  - Information concerning the laws prohibiting sexual abuse, the need to report such abuse, and the legal options available to victims of sexual abuse.
  - Information on how to cope with and rebuff unwanted physical and verbal sexual exploitation by other persons.
  - Psychologically sound methods of resisting unwanted peer pressure.
  - An emphasis, in a factual manner and from a public health perspective, that homosexuality is not a lifestyle acceptable to the general public and that homosexual conduct is a criminal offense under the laws of the state.
  - Comprehensive instruction in parenting skills and responsibilities, including the responsibility to pay child support by non-custodial parents, the penalties for non-



payment of child support, and the legal and ethical responsibilities of child care and child rearing

- A **local textbook committee** or committees shall be appointed by each separate local board of education. The number, size, and composition, which shall include parents, of the committee or committees shall be determined by each local board of education.
  - In order to qualify as a member of the committee
    - The member has no interest, directly or indirectly, in any contract that may be made under this article for the purchase of textbooks
    - The member has no interest as author, as associate author, as publisher, or as a representative of the author or publisher of any textbooks.
    - The member has no pecuniary interest, directly or indirectly, in the business or profits of any person, firm, or corporation engaged in manufacturing, publishing, or selling textbooks.
  - Publishers shall furnish samples of all state-adopted textbooks to each local board of education for evaluation by the local textbook committee.
- A public local board of education may not discriminate against students or parents on the basis of a religious viewpoint or religious expression.
- Students may express their beliefs about religion in homework, artwork, and other written and oral assignments free from discrimination based on the religious content of their submissions.

The Alabama State Board of Education believes that **few health risk behaviors have more damaging long-term effects on students than** the use of illegal drugs, **premarital sexual activity**, negligent parenting, and short-term emotional issues that may lead to consideration of suicide. Therefore, Code of Alabama (1975) laws and Alabama State Board of Education resolutions and regulations relative to these destructive behaviors and others are included in the appendices of this document. The Alabama State Board of Education strongly encourages the embodiment of these laws, resolutions, and regulations in all age- and content-appropriate contexts throughout this course of study.<sup>iii</sup>

Age of Majority =

Based on Alabama law, anyone under the age of 19 is considered a minor, while those 19 years old and older are considered adults.<sup>iv</sup>

Age of Consent = In Alabama, the age when children can legally consent or agree to sex is 16.<sup>v</sup>





# V. PARENTAL RIGHTS AT RISK IN ALABAMA

Warning! Most CSE programs put parental rights at risk by either encouraging or requiring that parents not be notified and/or by instructing children how to access such things as abortion, contraception and other so-called health services **without parental notification or consent**.

It is particularly dangerous to encourage students in this way, particularly considering the fact the laws often support what is being taught in CSE programs. For example:

Without notifying or receiving consent from their parents, minor children in Alabama may consent to and receive:

- All contraceptive services
- All STI (sexually transmitted infection) services
- Prenatal care services

In Alabama, parental consent is required for: Abortion services.
