I worked closely with district leadership to write the standards adding important information around identity, sexual violence prevention and healthy sexuality that aligns with research that supports a students' well-being. Our focus is on medically accurate, age-appropriate, inclusive health information. We also helped map the curriculum to align with the updated standards. As part of this partnership, I have trained the teachers and school nurses on the standards and the curriculum to aid in a successful implementation.

What talents and skills do you bring the standards and curriculum writing process?

My Master of Education increased my knowledge and skills around educational pedagogy, curriculum writing and creating trauma-informed learning environments. While my area of specialty is human sexuality, my academic background and classroom experience has honed my holistic approach to health education. Students are saturated with diverse messages and

I am open all afternoon, you can call when you have the time.

I do have the application information, but we did not ask demographic background info specifically on the application. That research I did on my own when inviting people to apply. That way they did not feel they were chosen solely on their race, culture, sexuality, etc...

As for the race and culture; I specifically invited (called, emailed, and spoke in person) people of varying races and cultures to be on the writing team, but none applied. The one individual of diversity she is referencing had no health education experience, he is a social work professor (mental health ties I can see), but that role fits more into the role of the advisory council than the writing team.

Addressing the LGBTQIA, I spoke with Tiffany at the training and also to Zainab about how to respectfully identify those individuals so we could get that perspective on the writing team, and no one had an answer for the proper way to invite/recruit/identify those individuals so I was not able to provide that diversity (I did invite 2 that I personally know are, but they did not want to apply). However, Zainab and I are working on a way to have that representation during the review and editing process. She has it in her notes to speak with Tiffany as well on October 31st.

When writing the standards, we are utilizing the advisory council's input as well as evidence and research-based resources that provide the content specialization of the subtopics, however, we discussed that the writing team should have the comprehensive lens since we cannot invite a content expert for every topic to be a writer...then we would not have educators or people within the schools (who will utilize the standards) on the team (unless we had 50 people). The rubric was created specifically to prevent exactly what she wants in regards to experts. That is why I created the Advisory Council and also plan to utilize those individuals in the review and editing process.

We do have two individuals on the writing team who specialize in working with individuals with disabilities. They are Adapted Physical Education teachers active on IEP teams that also teach Health Education. We had some apply that were APE, but no health education experience.

On the form I submitted to Zainab about the equity lens states how most to all of her questions are addressed. They are a work in progress and having the equity training so close to the selection process, I wasn't able to accomplish all that I had hoped. I wish I was superwoman. However, they are all being addressed and worked towards so that the final draft is completely supportive of the equity of Nebraska.

I am very glad she is in support of sexual education and human sexuality!!

Ryan,

Thank you for all of the emails yesterday. I will go through them and respond one at a time this week—starting with this one.

The rubric you sent to me is concerning if I understand it correctly. Because of all of our discussions at the board level about equity—I wondered if the rubric could have been updated to consider people with new and related subject proficiencies or to insure equitable representation at the very least.

I am curious how the NDE staff made sure to include people with a different sexual orientation or different races on the writing committee?

Also—the rubric does not take into account people that have master's and ph.d's in sexuality education—but yet are not medical professionals? The people I recommended have a very different type of expertise that does not appear to be on the committee from my quick searches of everyone. The rubric did not provide for their very important knowledge and experience. Also, is there anyone with a SPED background on the committee?

Many on the list seemed to have worked with NDE before in some capacity—which is probably good—or does it mean we use the same people repeatedly? There was a school nurse but the largest number of writers come from a P.E. background. I liked that the writing group has someone that is physically disabled. What appears to be missing, although I could be wrong, is people with advanced degrees and certified sexuality educators.

Furthermore, and most important to me, there appears to be no racial or sexual identity diversity. I really hope I am wrong—there was only one person I could not verify their race—and perhaps that would be the only person of color on the team. Everyone else was white.

Can you help me better understand how equity and diversity issues were weighed into these decisions? My district has lots of diversity, and I would hope that the writing committee would have several people of color, at least one African Amercan and one Latinx person, and definitely someone that identifies as LGBTQIA.

Without this diversity of backgrounds, I believe there will be some missed opportunities—and it will be hard for me to defend anything this group does if there isn't diversity on the team that represents my district. And, unless there is a diversity of thought and races and experiences on the front lines of these discussions—then we are missing out on potential creativity and innovation that comes with diversity. I don't care if you use the people I recommended—but the diversity issues are crucial.

THANK YOU for helping me understand this process better. I know that you and Matt cannot micromanage every decision made at NDE—but I do hope you can make corrections when there are equity issues to consider. Again—I hope my information is not completely correct—and perhaps those equity issues have already been handled. I only did a quick search on everyone so I could be wrong on some of these items.

Ryan—can you please get back to me and let me know about the diversity make-up of the writing team? I specifically want to know if there is an African American, a person who is Latinx, and if there are people that identify as LGBTQIA. I would also love to know if anyone who specializes in sexuality education?



The proposed Nebraska standards are based on national standards put forth by the CDC and other reputable organizations.

I appreciate everyone's feedback and I want to hear from my constituents about the specific matters they want to discuss. However-- as a state board member, or as any elected official-- I believe it is our job to learn from the experts and the science before we begin to politicize the topics.

Last year in Nebraska the number of children that committed suicide doubled in our state!! The largest contributor to youth suicide is bullying, much of that can be contributed to either actual or perceived gender identity or sexual orientation. We need to have productive conversations about science and facts and hear from our young people as well. These standards honor the complex diversity of the identities and experiences of students and families across the state. Health education needs to serve all students.

Please remember that school based health education is only a supplement to what is provided at home. Parents are the primary health educators of their children; whether they are talking or not. This is meant to supplement. A parent has the important role of discussing their values, their wishes and dreams for young people. A school's job is to provide a factual foundation to help safeguard their future.

I truly hope people will study the standards, give us the feedback at the link provided, and then ask questions when in doubt. Second-- also big kudos to you, Cory, on the interview you did on KETV 7 when the first draft was released. While I may have missed some interviews-- I have watched or read much of the media associated with the release of those standards-- and from what I have observed your talking points were the best. I would love it if we could make sure that all of our board members heard your television interview. Your talking points were very helpful to me-- and I would think my fellow board members would want to hear the same discussion in case they might want use similar language. I ultimately hope that me and my peers on the state board will be able to speak eloquently about--and with a healthy understanding of-- any of the topics that have become politicized.

I am available any of these times to connect with the writing committee. You may place me in either session.

Tuesday, March 23rd from 5:00 - 6:00 p.m.

Wednesday, March 24th from 12:00 - 1:00 p.m.

Lastly-- as I think back about the nondiscrimination position statement that we passed last year-- I recall that it definitely took some work to bring along and educate a couple of our fellow board members. There were 2 board members in particular that really didn't understand some of the wording that we wanted to add to the statement, however, I believe we made progress because we were able to bring outside speakers in and educate board members in a small group, and in a safe space that allowed them to ask questions. They eventually came to understand why we needed our language to be more inclusive and they respected the need to insure that we addressed the needs of ALL students in our position statement. As I think back to those committee discussions-you may recall we brought in volunteers from GLSEN Omaha and from the Omaha Women's Fund. I am quite confident that if we had not done that work-- we would never have created such an inclusive position statement. Therefore-- I wonder if we can set up committee meeting discussions that provide similar opportunities for board education. Not just the education that will be provided by the writing committee-- but by external

consultants that work on some of these specialized topics everyday. I do not think it is enough to just have public testimony-- because that is not a safe space for board members to ask questions and process information.

I know there are many great people to select from that could be speakers. A couple of ideas come to mind:

- 1. Dr. Deb Tomek, member of the writing committee and well-known Omaha MD
- 2. Someone from <u>CASEL</u> or someone locally that is a skilled in teaching SEL in the classroom-- or someone that could speak to some of the equity topics relating to the teaching of SEL.
- 3. Lisa Schultze, a certified sexuality educator, certified through AASECT (American Association of Sexuality Educators, Counselors & Therapists), and staff member of Women's Fund of Omaha
- 4. Someone who is a parent of a transgender student-- I have a friend that is a parent of a transgender youth and I know she would be happy to join a committee discussion. I am also sure Abby Swatsworth or others could recommend a parent too.

Additionally-- I know the Teaching and Learning committee is the committee overseeing these discussions. Ryan--is it possible that the strategic planning committee could also have a committee meeting discussion on any of these topics?

NE Health Education Standards Development (March 30, 2021)

Some important things to know about these standards:

- These proposed standards were written to be age-appropriate, medically-accurate, and science-based.
- The writing and editing team consisted of educators, administrators, medical doctors, school psychologists, health professionals, researchers, nurses and parents.
- This draft is based on the national CDC guidelines.
- The final draft of these standards will not become a requirement for any school district. These standards are intended only to help school districts understand the health education best practices so local districts can make informed decisions.
- Many students are already learning about health education from online sites-- including TikTok. But those sources can be harmful to the growth of young mind.

The goal of this process is to create a framework for health education in our state to give our students the skills and knowledge to maintain and promote lifelong health. We support the development of comprehensive health education programs designed to:

- Motivate students to maintain and improve their health;
- Advocate for self and others;
- Prevent disease:
- Form healthy relationships; and,
- Avoid or reduce health-related risk behaviors.

The Department is engaging in a thoughtful and deliberate process to ensure that all voices and perspectives are heard.

The Department of Education has engaged education experts (teachers, administrators, ESU staff, postsecondary representatives) as well as doctors, nurses, psychologists, public health professionals, and other relevant health experts to create an initial draft of health education standards.

The initial draft has been informed by reviews of research and evidence-based best practices in a variety of health-related content areas, as well as an examination of other states' health education standards.

This process is just beginning – there will be ample opportunity for all voices to be heard.

Our role, as state board members, is to listen to the expertise and feedback of stakeholders and discern the best path forward that supports the health of all of our students.

State Standards/Local Control: We want these health education standards to provide a strong framework for schools across our state to support their students in leading safe and healthy

lives. However, the implementation of the health education standards will not be mandatory and decisions will be made by local districts, providing yet another opportunity for community voices to be heard.

Response to "Health education is the role of parents and families." Parents are the primary educators of their children. It is absolutely the role of parents to have these important conversations with their children about their health and healthy relationships, as well as to infuse those conversations with more than just facts, but also their values and wishes and dreams for their children's healthy development. The role of health education in the schools is to provide the facts; it is the role of families to surround those facts with values.

Response to "These standards were created by activists." This initial draft was created by educators, doctors, nurses, psychologists, public health professionals, and others with specific expertise related to the content strands within health education. We are now at the part of the process that will allow any and all stakeholders to provide substantive input and relevant expertise to inform the process. Everyone has an opportunity to weigh in.

Response to "These health standards are providing controversial/ideological instruction."

Providing science-based, medically accurate, age-appropriate information to our students is not controversial. It is our goal, as the board, to support the creation of a framework for health education that is based in research and expertise as to what our students need to develop the skills and knowledge to maintain and promote lifelong health.

Other notes:

This board made an important commitment to <u>Nondiscrimination and Equitable Educational</u> <u>Opportunities in Schools</u>. We committed to ensuring "all Nebraskans, across all backgrounds and circumstances, have equitable access and opportunities for success." Our expressed "goal of equity efforts is that all students are <u>known</u>, <u>heard</u>, <u>and supported</u> while having access to the opportunities and resources needed to be ready for success in their post-secondary learning experiences, careers, and civic lives." It will be our goal to ensure that educational equity is represented in this health education framework and any educational frameworks moving forward.

Our students bring complex realities to school every day. They come from diverse family structures. According to the <u>Academy of Pediatrics</u>, they have a stable sense of their gender identity by age four – and for some of our students, that identity may not align with their sex assigned at birth. Many of our students fit into categories that are historically marginalized and leaving these diverse identities and realities out of critical conversations about their health, development, and healthy relationships leaves them without the benefits and safety that health education can provide.

All students deserve to see themselves represented in their health education. There is nothing political or controversial about providing age-appropriate health education that recognizes young people's complex realities. What is controversial is withholding complete, honest information that young people need in order to plan their futures.

Email and Phone Responses, Talking Points:

I have had requests to provide a document of talking points for the many messages that each of us are receiving to ensure we are all on the same page with our messages/responses to constituents. Instead of reinventing the wheel I am attaching the document of talking points given to the Teaching and Learning Committee at the March Committee meeting. The four Board members not in the T/L committee received them that same afternoon along with a copy of the standards. I will attach other documents the NDE has provided earlier this month that you can refer to and refresh your memory. The message responses that have been shared by Board colleagues with me are all well done and what I consider 'spot on'.

Friday Board Meeting:

It is well understood that there will be many constituents in attendance for Public Comment on the agenda. Lora will be at the door to have everyone who wishes to speak sign in. Next to her will be the LPD Officer. The Capitol Security Guard will be in the room. Speakers will be called to the podium in the order they sign in. Public Comment speakers will be brought into the room in groups of 10. When one group of 10 is done, they will be escorted out while the next 10 are brought in. The Commissioner will give general comments to each group when they enter and are seated. He will explain the process of the Standards and what will be next. He will address some of the misinformation that is being distributed. Vice President Koch Johns will be the timekeeper. She will hold up the one-minute sign and speak when time is up. We have set aside 2 hours for Public Comment. It may be necessary that we follow our policy of abbreviating the time for each speaker. If so, that will be an action item just prior to Public Comment.

Following the Teaching and Learning Committee report by Lisa, I will be opening it up for discussion by Board members regarding the Health Standards. I anticipate there will be a good discussion among the Board.

Key Features of the Nebraska Health Education Standards – Draft #1

The **structure** of the Health Education Standards:

- Provides a framework for students to develop skills and knowledge for health literacy.
- Organized into eight (8) content strands for skill development in grades K 12.
- Include grade-level standards for grades K-8.
- High school standards are course-based and designed to help prepare students for independent living and health literacy.

The **content** of the Health Education Standards:

- Promotes the development of health knowledge, health-related skills, and positive attitudes toward health and wellbeing.
- Motivates students to maintain and improve their health; advocate for self and others; prevent disease; form healthy relationships and avoid or reduce health-related risk behaviors.
- Aligns to and supports the National Health Education Standards, the Health Education
 Curriculum Analysis Tool's Healthy Behavior Outcomes, the National Sex Education Standards,
 and the Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning (CASEL) Social Emotional
 Learning Core Competencies.
- Reviewed to ensure the content is medically and scientifically accurate and age appropriate.
- Acknowledges abstinence as the most effective form of disease and pregnancy prevention and acknowledges additional disease and pregnancy prevention strategies.
- Includes inclusive language in relation to sex, gender identity, sexuality, and varying family structures.
- Increases expectations across all grade levels for students to develop knowledge and skills that create positive social, emotional, and mental health.
- Promotes the examination of prejudice, discrimination, stereotypes, and stigmas (e.g., biases) and includes strategies to promote dignity and respect for all people.
- Recognizes the influence technology, including social media, has on one's mental health and wellness.


Effective Health Education: Supporting Students' Well-Being

Decades of rigorous research is conclusive—complete, honest, inclusive health education supports students' well-being. Young people need access to medically-accurate, science-based health information to protect their health and plan for their futures. 2

Effective, science-based health education improves health outcomes of young people by:

- Delaying the age of first sexual intercourse;
- Reducing unprotected sex and increasing use of condoms and contraception;
- Reducing unintended pregnancy; and
- Reducing rates of HIV and other STDs/STIs.





Effective health education promotes <u>social and emotional learning (SEL)</u> that contributes to academic achievement, fewer truancies⁶, reduced risk-taking and healthy relationships.⁷ A 2020 analysis of three decades of research⁸ demonstrated increased student efficacy in:

- → Empathy
- → Respect for others and increased bystander interventions
- → Communication

- → Positive self-image (including body image)
- → Increased recognition of gender equity
- → Increased sense of self-control and safety



supports the need for inclusive, equitable health education. This approach allows for trained teachers that create a network of caring adults and a protective school environment for all students.

- → LGBTQ youth who report having at least one accepting adult were 40% less likely to report a suicide attempt.9
- → Having six LGBTQ supportive teachers or staff in a school can turn the environment from toxic to protective.¹⁰
- Social determinants of health must be addressed in the curriculum with a focus on how race, ethnicity, socio-economic status, sexual orientation, and gender identity and expression are related to inequitable health outcomes because of systemic injustices.¹¹

PARENTS/CAREGIVERS MATTER

Effective school-based health education provides resources and support to enhance parent-child communication.

- In a representative sample of 1,500 parents from the Omaha Public School district, 93.1% supported the teaching of abstinence and prevention along with over 70% of parents supporting instruction on sexual orientation and gender identity.
- Parents and likely voters, regardless of political affiliation, religion and/or regional demographic, overwhelmingly support instruction on abstinence, birth control, STIs, healthy relationships, sexual orientation and puberty.¹³

Highlights from 2018-2019 Nebraska School Health Profiles:

- The good news: 65.6% encourage staff to attend professional development on safe and supportive school environments for all students, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity.
- Only 14.5% of Nebraska schools implement HIV, STD and pregnancy prevention strategies that meet the needs of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and questioning youth.
- Young people are disproportionately impacted by STDs and information about condoms is a key protective factor.¹⁴ Only 8% of high school students have been tested for STDs and only 23% of Nebraska schools instruct on how to consistently and correctly use a condom.

Why Implement Health Standards

According to the Centers for Disease Control, effective health education provides materials that are free of cultural bias but includes information, activities and examples that are inclusive of diverse cultures and identities (such as gender, race, ethnicity, religion, age, physical/mental ability, appearance, and sexual orientation).

The Health Education standards released by the Nebraska Department of Education were created and reviewed by teachers, medical professionals, school psychologists, sexual health professionals, community health educators, researchers and parents/caregivers. They were written to be in alignment with the Nebraska Board of Education's Non-Discrimination and Equitable Educational Opportunities Position Statement.

Effective health education helps young people navigate sexual development and become healthy adults. It builds on a foundation of knowledge and skills relating to human development, decision making, abstinence, contraception, and disease prevention.

<u>Need for Effective Health Education:</u> Most school districts in Nebraska do not have sexual orientation and gender identity written into their standards as key scientific concepts. Standards and curricula that reflect all students' identities creates affirming and protective school environments that are linked to emotional wellbeing and academic success.

Health education that is age appropriate and medically accurate should be the standard for all students in Nebraska. Early, age-appropriate conversations on gender identity and expression protects students' well-being and their ability to make informed decisions about relationships in their lives.

According to the Academy of Pediatrics, children have a stable understanding of their gender identity by age four, including the gender-role stereotypes that can be harmful. Basic health education includes these developmentally appropriate conversations in order to protect their futures.

Decades of rigorous research is conclusive—comprehensive health education supports students' well-being while abstinence-only education is not only ineffective, but scientifically and ethically problematic. Comprehensive sex education that is age-appropriate and medically accurate is a key component to effective health education.

Nationally, parents and caregivers overwhelming support instruction on abstinence, birth control, STIs, healthy relationships, sexual orientation, and puberty in both middle and high school. Effective health education is age-appropriate, trauma-informed, medically-accurate and science based.

<u>How Health Education Impacts Students:</u> In Nebraska, 57% of students have sex by the time they graduate high school and yet only 8% of students have ever been tested for an STD. We need to provide students with shame-free information so they can care for their health and well-being.

Delaying sex (abstinence) is an important part of any comprehensive health curricula. However, information about birth control and navigating healthy relationships before students need it (not after!) helps them plan for their future and make informed decisions.

Comprehensive sex education helps young people by delaying the age of first sexual intercourse, reducing unprotected sex and reducing unintended pregnancy. It also improves mental health outcomes and reduces dating violence.

Most LGBTQ students in Nebraska experience victimization at school. Most, 60%, never report the incident to school staff. LGBTQ+ inclusive sex education that centers transgender and nonbinary identities benefits all young people.

Greetings friends,

I am looking for someone that can help the Nebraska State Board of Education members come up with a "values" statement. We have many policies and statements-- but we have never had the conversation around our values. And-- since the board makeup changed by over 50% in the last 3 years-- I thought this was an important step for our group to take. As the chair of the Strategic Planning committee-- I am taking on this project and in my committee meeting on May 6th I want my committee members to recommend steps for working on our values statement. And-- I hope to have a values statement pretty far along-- prior to September 7th when our board will approve a draft of the proposed Health Standards.

When I say values statement—I mean something like our <u>nondiscrimination position</u> statement. This statement is something that I led the work on 2 years ago to make it more inclusive than the original draft that was brought forward.

A values statement | believe should be different than the nondiscrimination statement-- | am not certain if | am correct but a values statement says to me more about how we will make our decisions and base our decisions. For example-- | am working back in the foster care sector these days and in this work we base our decisions on a triangle of 3 equal parts-- decisions are based on 1/3 evidenced-based facts; 1/3 clinical experience (experience of educational professionals in our sector) and 1/3 on the values of the family/cultural community.

I am hoping that each of you may either be interested in leading this work, or might know of someone that would be good to lead/facilitate these discussions for us. We might look at some co-facilitation.

I anticipate the facilitator would lead 3 discussions-- both over zoom:

- One hour-long meeting with the Strategic Planning committee to prepare for the board retreat.
- 2. A 3-hour board retreat over Zoom that would help us work in a few small breakout groups and then come together as a big group.

I do not believe that these steps are going to help us come to the best results in our work to develop health standards-- so I am working with NDE staff to come up with ideas that have been successful in other policy-making arenas.

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Hope you are enjoying your work as a Regent member. I truly love my work on the State Board of Education, and I am grateful to be on the board especially now as we make one of the most important decisions that will impact the youth of Nebraska.

Maureen, Patsy, Ryan & Matt,

As you know, I have been a little relentless about the need to provide our board members with educational presentations around the topics that are controversial in nature in our proposed health standards. And, now that the emails and phone calls I am receiving are veering away from actually being interested parents—but instead I am hearing from political bullies with an agenda —and they are using false videos and talking points to make their cases—I want to raise this conversation again.

It is definitely the precedent in Nebraska that a government-run, educational organization like ours, that deals in scholarly topics, should be hearing from experts. And-- furthermore-- based on what I am learning it appears that perhaps we should not be placing equal weight on public comment. Using public comment to play a large role in our decision-making is not the best practice for similar organizations like the university. While public comment is important--it should not be our only tool.



have now spoken with two members of the Nebraska Board of Regents to learn how they handle complex scholarly topics when they need experts to weigh-in. They do not leave it up to the board members to do their own research-- they understand that many board members will not even know what topics to research when there are complex topics being considered. I also learned-- that the Board of Regents only allows 30 minutes of public comment per board meeting-- regardless of the topic and regardless how many people show up. They are much more prone to spend time listening to scholarly experts rather than the public since they are an educational institution.

The Board of Regents has dealt with many similar controversial educational topics-- including stem cell research and topics related to climate change. In every case, they have had experts from within the university, and experts from other states, come in and give related educational presentations-- both in small committee groups and to the full board. The committee groups can be called a task force- in their interpretation it does not need to be a formal standing committee.

I also learned that it is very common for the president of the University to call the Board of

Regents together into a zoom call, and then break them down into 2 groups using the breakout room technology. This allows the board members to speak to each other about the controversial topics so they are not having public discussions. Then—they will be mixed up again in another small group on the same zoom call so they can discuss further with other board members. These special meetings do not align with any specific committee—they are just called by the president of the university.

If we can all agree that it is urgent to have educational speakers brought in—then the logistics of "how" this is accomplished would be up to the NDE staff—I am merely trying to demonstrate that what I am requesting is very common practice in Nebraska with the university. And the university is the closest type of institution that we would compare ourselves too.

I believe that it is not enough to just listen to public comment. And—I tend to think it is irresponsible if that is all that is allowed. And—I am not only concerned about our board having the information they need (including myself) - but I also want to set the example for the local school boards. It is a horrifying thought that the local boards would merely leave the decisions about these standards to only the public comment portion. Those local board meetings could become a hornets nest of hate instead of informed discussions.

Also--let's be very clear. Scientific, evidenced-based information is not a "both sides" matter. We as the people with the responsibility to hold up the educational standards for the state-must be primarily interested in knowing the research, facts, and evidence. I value listening to the public-- I believe that is important. But educational standards are not supposed to be based only on the public input-- and right now that is the only presentations we are allowing.

I want us to hear from doctors, health educators, therapists, early childhood experts and psychologists. There has been too much information thrown at us and represented to be "facts" when they are not facts. However, we expect board members to know the difference.

Thank you for your consideration of this matter. And thank you Ryan for helping me figure out how to better articulate and demonstrate what I was trying to propose.
