Key Findings

As indicated by published program descriptions, ^{1,2,3} in 7th and 8th grade the *Get Real* curriculum is a comprehensive sex education (CSE) program (i.e., it teaches the use of condoms and contraception and may also teach abstinence) and in the 6th grade it is typically a type of abstinence education program (i.e., it emphasizes abstinence and does not teach about condoms/contraception). Both versions of the program are listed on the U.S. federal Teen Pregnancy Prevention program's website as having shown "evidence of effectiveness."

However, according to a published research review by *The Institute for Research & Evaluation*, ⁴ *Get Real-CSE* has not produced sufficient evidence to be labeled an effective or evidence-based program. The program has not demonstrated long-term effects and has shown only one modest short-term effect—reducing sexual initiation by 16% for less than 9 months after the program. This minor impact was produced after students participated in the *Get Real-CSE* program for two consecutive years. No measures were taken of other key outcomes—condom use, pregnancy, or STDs—so the program's effect on these targeted outcomes is unknown. (*Get Real* is marketed by ETR, an offshoot of Planned Parenthood.)

Summary. Contrary to the U.S. Teen Pregnancy Prevention website,⁵ *Get Real-CSE* has shown little evidence of effectiveness—a small short-term reduction in sexual initiation, and no demonstrated impact on teen condom use, pregnancy, or STDs.
