
Inside & Out: The Elements of Comprehensive Sexual Education

The "Inside & Out" assessment tool—established by UNESCO and International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF)—provides a revealing inside look at the elements of CSE programs. The list of criteria clearly shows that CSE programming is designed to promote sexual rights and sexual pleasure to children at the expense of sexual health.
